Continues

The second edition is here. I want to appreciate the efforts of team Writers club, your patron and all those who contributed articles that enabled the publication of this edition.

In the last edition I did indicate that by 2003 we had attained a student population of 156. This was a very big opportunity considering the nature of the school then. But this opportunity proved the biggest test for the young school. With limited capacity to handle that population there were a number of problems that arose that required quick solutions. I will elaborate these in more detail.

The challenges

The first major bottle neck was inadequate classroom space. The improvised classes curved out of the commercial had been designed to accommodate only 40 students. Now that in S.1 and S.2 the number had gone beyond that limit, we experienced a serious crisis for classroom space. Time came when the two classes were filled with desks leaving the teacher with a space of less than half a meter to stand. You can imagine how difficult it became for the teachers to turn around in the classes. Erasing blackboards was a real menace for the front seaters as all their faces would be dusted with chalk.

We encouraged our land lord who was himself our partner to construct the front side of the building and this he did. So by the end of 1st term 2003 we had temporarily overcome shortage of classroom space. An important facility like a staff room was not allocated any space. We made a temporary papyrus structure in front of the main building to serve

as a staffroom.

Now that we had got adequate space for the classes and a room had remained vacant, we decided to start a hostel facility. The very first student in hostel came all the way from Katulikire in Bweyale and was called Odong Denis. He was known by the alias Mandevu. He would sleep in the room alone and his only attendant at this time was the night guard; a one Kabalega, a prominent transporter in Kigumba now. This boy remained alone in the hostel for the whole term. Many times we would call him to eat meals with us in our homes.

By the end of second term few boys had joined Odong. So with some space available we decided to open a girl's hostel too. Two girls turned up and these were Kimuli Lillian and Birungi Beatrice. Kimuli did give a hint on their hostel experiences in the last edition. I think students and the community at large were so apprehensive about the whole hostel issue because of poor facilities. But we encouraged our students to stay on.

In 2004 we had an S4 class and had the desire of teaching them at night. This could only be possible if the students were in the hostel. Through our encouragement many of them joined hostel. The number grew so big that we could not accommodate all the students. This became yet another serious challenge. We were compelled to look around for a house to rent. Unfortunately there were no houses in the neighborhood that would accommodate more than 10 students. The ideal one we got was at the extreme eastern part of Kitwanga about 1km away from

the school. We had no option but to rent it. We shall remain grateful to Ms. Kerima Juma Wani who allowed us to rent her premises for our boys. However, once the boys were away from our close supervision they begun to misbehave. We began to get stories of escapism, alcoholism, love affairs, smoking, stealing maize from neighborhoods etc. We had to think first to have them returned as soon as possible.

Fortunately at this time the school had begun to generate some funds to pay for rent. Boosted with these funds Maxwell began to develop the plot he had bought earlier on opposite the school site. By third term of 2004 one side of the boys' quarters was complete. We decided to shift one of the classes from the main site to this new building. This provided us with some space and we were relieved to return the boys to the school campus.

We faced a serious shortage of water. By then piped water had not reached Kigumba. Our only sources of water were wells constructed by a one Kato and a borehole near Unique Hotel Kigumba. There was also another borehole at Kihura 2 village. At all these water points we made monthly contributions to allow our students to draw water. We had cooks like Bahemuka Julius and Byakatonda Vincent (RIP) who would fetch water for cooking. They were later joined by Kiirya Moses alias Kabalega in that department. Boys would fetch their own water every evening. This was risky as they would have to cross the high way every evening to draw water. Besides, there were chances that some bad elements would use the excuse of fetching water to wonder in town or go for films. As is always the case when there is scarcity of water, quarrels between our students and the community at water points were all but too often.

For the girls we did not want to risk allowing them to roam in search of water. In the circumstances, two of our students Eriya Tibaijuka and Sanyu Emmanuel undertook to fetch water for the girls. This would help them cover their tuition fees. They executed this task with utmost dedication. I do not remember any single day when the girls missed water. It is from this endeavor that an everlasting bond between these gentlemen and intensive as an institution and some of us as individuals was created. We shall always remain grateful for their efforts. The two have since been supported to pursue further education and are now employed at Intensive. Eriya is a grade five teacher while Sanyu is a UDBS graduate. There is a lesson for readers but more especially students to learn from this experience.

When the queues at Kato's wells and the village boreholes got menacingly long, we were compelled to think of options. Two options were available. First we approached a lady called Leah, a famous land lord in Kigumba who had a borehole in her compound to allow our students to draw water from her borehole. Her answer was neither negative nor positive. She told us, 'I will pray over it and let you know'. One term, 2 terms, 3, a year, the response did not come.

The second option was to sink our own well. We approached a landlady in the neighborhood Mrs. Joyce Nile, better known by her pet name- Abwooli whose land stretched towards a seasonal swamp. She welcomed the idea and the deal was concluded. By the end of 2004 the well was functional. It had been constructed by Mr. Kato. Actually it became a source of water for a section of the community of Kitwanga.

The other serious challenge we faced until 2009 was lack of reliable power. We had bought a small original yamaha generator as early as the second term of 2002, but it was stolen in third term of the same year in circumstances we failed to understand. We suspect the guard colluded with thieves to steal it or he was away from duty that day. We tried solar power, hired several generators but all did not provide a permanent solution. It went on until 2009, when we got advice from one Charles on the use of diesel engines with separate dynamos. The rest as they say is history. We have never regretted.

Construction of permanent premises

Meanwhile in June 2003 we had bought one acre of land from Ms. Rudiya Nyangendo opposite Kigumba Police post. This is the site on which we intended to erect permanent structures. However, the land was quite small and besides it was so near the centre of town. We had to abandon the idea all together. The land was later exchanged with maxwell's other land near the current school site and I'm privy to information that it was transferred to the current owners of Mama Giina Primary school.

In July 2003 boosted by financial injection from the forth partner who had recently joined us, we bought two acres of land from Mr. Abdu Aramathan. This is where the school is apparently situated. From the initial two acres the school has now expanded to over 7 acres. This has been possible through the cooperation of neighbors who have always informed us whenever they have pieces of land to sell.

We did not start construction until November 2003. The construction of the first block (from the current staffroom to the Academics office) was extremely difficult in the absence of external financing. The little funds collected at school had to be used to run recurrent expenditures as well as construction. Achieving this balance became a very strenuous exercise. The construction was undertaken by Mr. Albert Uyukuthu then and currently a pastor at PAG church Kigumba. He was later to recommend to our school over ten students sponsored by a charity organization's project overseen by his church. We appreciate the contribution of Pastor Albert towards our cause.

In raising this block and three others that followed, we were greatly helped by three outstanding individuals. We shall ever remain grateful for their efforts. These were Harriet Nyakiirya who provided us with cement and other assorted construction materials and the late Mr. and Mrs Haruna Wabyona who provided us with timber. Most of these materials were provided to us on credit and payments would be made later.

By 2005 after producing 'O' level results that surprised everybody in the area (I alluded to these results in the previous edition) we experienced an unprecedented rise in the number of students. Lack of classroom space that we had temporarily solved became an issue again. Using our internally generated funds we decided to roof

the first block that had reached ring beam level, and once the roof was up that was all.

We began our transfer to the current site in term 1 2005. It was done in phases. First were S.3's and S.4s'. We were careful to choose these classes because the students had been with us and understood the far we had come. The classrooms were merely a framework of brick wall with a roof of iron sheets and a blackboard. No window and door shutters, no plaster etc. On the floor we had poured hardcore stones. It can be imagined how difficult it was to place desks on such a ground. This means we now had two run two campuses: one at the old site and one at the new one. It was very difficult to run two campuses. We had S.3 and S.4 class boarders who had to commute from the old campus to attend classes at the new site every day. Along the way you wouldn't know what would happen. Porridge for breakfast had to be ferried every day from the old site to the new site. We fabricated a wheel burrow for this purpose and students sarcastically named it 'School truck'. Kisembo gave it a UAB plate series. Kisembo David (the current grinding machine Operator), Bahemuka Julius and Byakatonda Vincent (RIP) were at the front of pushing the 'truck' to bring porridge for students and food for staff. There is one event related to ferrying food to the new campus that is still fresh in my memory. A student whom I will not name because she regretted her deed and apologized, one day teased Kisembo by strongly shaking the bicycle carrying staff food, and the food poured. I did not want to send her home. So I made her prepare and serve staff food. She had to do this while wearing the cook's apron. She did it for two days and was seriously ridiculed by her colleagues. On the third day she came crying and apologized. I forgave her.

Meanwhile at the old site the number of boarders greatly increased. There was particularly lack of a room for revision. This compelled us to construct a make shift papyrus structure. Many a times it was also the venue for night punishments especially for those who had failed exams and tests. I think it is in cognisance of this fact that students named it Fire Base. The Fire base would have to be repaired virtually every term. Being made of papyrus every time a student wanted to glance outside they would have to tear the papyrus apart.

In first term 2005 there was yet a challenge of registering students for UNEB exams. We had a total of about 105 S.4s. When we approached Atapara SS for assistance as in the previous year they could only take 70 students. So we had to look for a second centre. We were happy to be helped by Loro SS also in Oyam that absorbed the remaining students. These students like the previous ones also performed well and this increased the confidence of the public in our school.

In 2006 we made a decision to shift the whole school to the new site. This was after we had roofed the second block (the current exam hall) that we had ambitiously embarked on erecting in 2004. Like in the first case this was also an incomplete structure. We also constructed temporary structures made up of tree bucks commonly known as

Makoko. We deliberately placed our upper classes in these Makoko rooms.

Examination centres

In the same year we applied and were granted a UNEB centre for O' level. We were excited at the prospect of having our students sitting at our school. I want to thank our longtime friend Mr. Kaliisa Ronald for the role he played in this endeavor. We had a setback though that year that UNEB exams leaked to an extent beyond what we had ever known. Newspapers were reporting that UNEB exams were being sold on streets! Some local authorities who had never believed that we could pass students to the level we were doing soon accused us of cheating. I and Kaliisa shall never forget one of the officials, I think in local security then, who met us in my office and accused us of malpractice and demanded that we handle the issue 'administratively', whatever that meant. We finally went through the exams and we produced some of the best students in Masindi District then.

Having revived A' level section in 2005, we also had candidates of UACE in 2006. Without a centre for that level of our own, we registered the candidates at Masindi Academy. The following year the candidates sat at Masindi hall. We got our own centre for 'A' level in 2008.

In 2007 March a misfortune befell us. An afternoon heavy storm coming from the North West direction blew off the roofs of two Makoko classes. It got students in class. We were lucky that no serious injuries were recorded. We had to adjust our budgets immediately so as to re-roof the structures.

Constructing Dormitories

Meanwhile the hostels remained at the old site. Boarders would commute to and fro everyday; a state akin to a day school. This presented a serious managerial challenge. We then embarked on building dormitories. For the first block it was fairly easy because we had a huge anti hill within the compound which we encouraged students to make bricks from. These students included Anikwa Jamal, Lumonya Mutwalib, Okura James, Obalim Patrick, Okecha David, Okidi Alfred, Komakech Joseph, Sanyu and Eriya. We used the bricks that were laid by these gentlemen to build the first dormitory. The first group to be transferred to the new site was boys. These were later followed by girls in 2009. This marked the complete transfer of the school to the new site. As was expected the transfer to the new home came with its problems. But we worked hard solving them as they rose until we achieved the current status.

Such was the intriguing journey of intensive. It was a journey full of challenging bottlenecks but with resilience, commitment, honesty and cooperation with people we were able to reach this far. It is a journey from which our students can draw inspiration as they execute tasks in different fields and start their own development projects.

Qn. How did you feel the first time you were named reverend?

Ans. I was humbled, in fact very happy because I saw it as an achievement in life and a call from God. Unfortunately my parents were not so happy because by that time reverends were regarded to be so poor, yet they needed to see the fruits of education from me. That withstanding I never gave up and continued serving my God.

Qn. What about your educational background reverend, could you please tell us?

Ans. In 1955, at the age of 5 years, I joined school. The school lacked scholastic materials and we used to write on the ground. We even didn't have qualified teachers like you the young people of today. We were taught how to write and read, arithmetic and also taught religion. In 1958, I transferred to Kiryandongo C O U for P.2. I used to walk seven kilometers to and from school at the age of eight. At the age of 10 I decided to go back to my former school because of the distance factor.

Though I was a brilliant student in class, I was never interested in studies because I didn't know its importance. In primary six I even remember totally refusing to go back to school. I went back to cultivate cotton, after some years I realized I was the only uneducated youth in my village and my age mates were successful. I then decided to go back to school but couldn't afford fees because my father, who would have done that, had given up on me. I then used my little savings to educate myself when I finally sat my PLE. It's from there that my interest in education continuously grew until I finished and right now as I speak to you, I have a masters and currently planning to go for a PHD.

Qn. What about your working experience reverend?

Ans. Briefly I would say I did a lot of odd jobs before I became a teacher. I worked as a porter for a year at kinyara, I was a good farmer, worked in the ministry for works for three years and so many others.

Qn. Briefly tell us about your children reverend?

Ans. Like I told you before, I have six biological children and I have educated over 50 children, some orphans and others who do not afford school fees but want to study. Am still doing that now

Ans. Well, hmmm!! It all started when I was a primary school teacher besides, I was so committed to serving God. I felt it was a divine call and as I did that I felt more interested in serving God. Because of the great work

Ans. Wow, I remember the wonderful time I had in U.K as tourist in 2009, when I got married and so many others. Not forgetting this, each and every day you wake up alive is a good moment because so many do not.

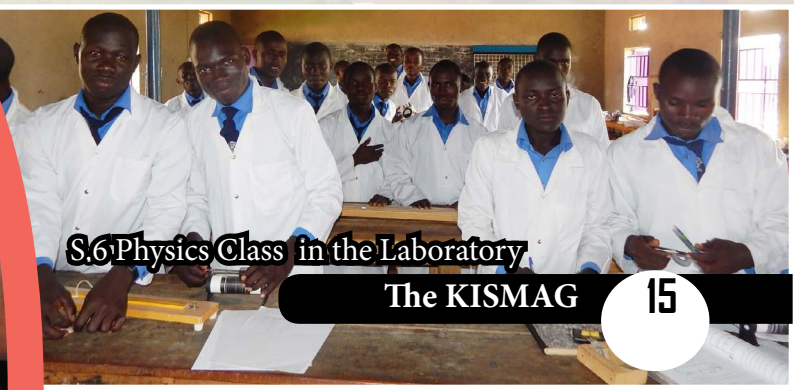

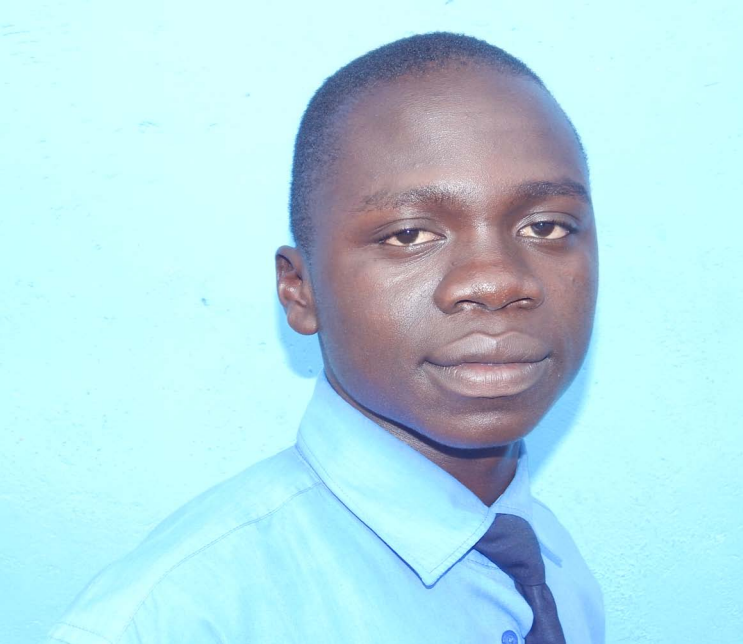


What you didn't know about this man!

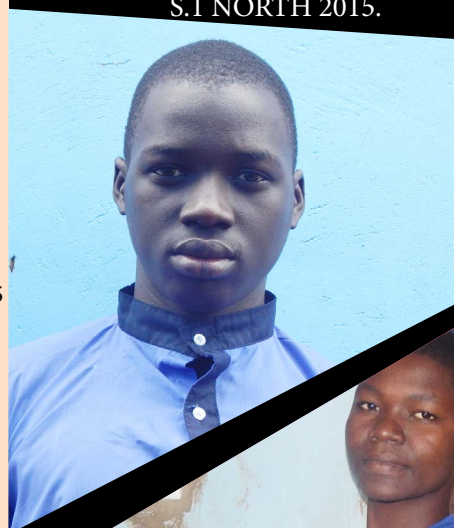

Today I want to give some of the tips on how to stay healthy in school and these include the following:-

Nutrition (Feeding)

-Eat enough food that can provide the body with the required nutrition to boost the body immunity

-Drink clean and safe water

-Keep all feeding utensils clean by washing them after use

Personal hygiene.

Personal hygiene refers to a comprehensive cleaning and taking care of your body. Maintaining personal hygiene is necessary for a lot of reasons; these can be personal, social, psychological or simply as a means of life.

These include the following;

-Daily bathing which prevents or keeps us free from getting infections, diseases and unpleasant odours (bad smell)

-Washing hands after visiting latrines and before eating

-Brushing your teeth at least after every meal

-Wearing clean clothing

-Avoid sharing bathing materials like basins, towels etc. This helps to avoid contracting infections such as STDs, skin infections like ring worms.

-Always cut finger nails short to avoid harbouring germs that can cause infections to your body.

-Keep your hair short and comb regularly to remain smart in appearance.

-Practise proper waste disposal and keep the surrounding clean, daily cleaning of the rooms.

Health Care and medical Service

Always sleep under mosquito net to avoid mosquito bites that can predispose to getting malarial infections.

Always seek for medical services in time which the school has made it available in the school clinic.



Rest and sleep

Always try your best to have enough sleep. This will enable the brain to gain its strength for the next day. Avoid things which interrupt rest and sleep.

Why getting enough sleep is important

-Learning and memory. Sleep helps the brain commit new information to memory through a process called memory consolidation. In studies, people who had enough sleep after learning a task did better on tests later.

-Metabolism and weight. Chronic sleep deprivation may cause weight gain by affecting our bodies' process and store carbohydrates, and by alternating levels of hormones that affect our appetite.

-Mood. Sleep loss may result in irritability, impatient, inability to concentrate and moodiness. Too little sleep can also leave you too tired to do things you like to do.

EXERCISE

Physical exercise is anybody's activity that enhances or maintains physical fitness and overall health and wellness.

It helps in maintaining the muscle strength, weight loss and boost the immune system.

At least do exercise for thirty minutes or one hour daily.

Understanding Hepatitis B

Hepatitis B is an infection of your liver. It can cause scarring of the organ, liver failure, and cancer. It can be fatal if it isn't treated. It's spread when people come in contact with the blood, open sores, or body fluids of someone who has the hep. B virus. The good news is that most cases of the disease don't last a long time. Your body fights it off within a few months, and you're immune for the rest of your life. That means you can't get it again.

What Happens to People Who Have It?

Your doctor will know you've recovered when your blood tests show no signs of active infection. But some people don't get rid of the infection. If you have it for more than 6 months, you're what's called a carrier, even if you don't have symptoms. This means you can give the disease to someone else through:

- Unprotected sex
- Contact with your blood or an open sore
- Sharing needles or syringes

Doctors don't know why, but the disease does go away in a small number of carriers. For others, it becomes what's known as chronic. That means you have an ongoing liver infection. It can lead to cirrhosis or hardening of the organ. It scars over and stops working. Some people also get liver cancer. If you're a carrier, don't donate blood, plasma, body organs, tissue, or sperm. Tell anyone you could infect, whether it's a sex partner, or your doctor or dentist, that you have it.

How Common Is Hepatitis B?

The number of people who get this disease is down, the CDC says. Rates have dropped from an average of 200,000 per year in the 1980s to around 18,000 in 2012. People between the ages of 20 and 49 are most likely to get it.

Only 5% to 10% of adults and children older than 5

who have hepatitis B end up with a chronic infection. The numbers aren't so good for those younger than 5 (25% to 50%) and even higher for infants infected at birth (90%).

How Do I Know if I Have It?

When you're first infected, the warning signs include:

- Jaundice. (Your skin or the whites of the eyes turn yellow, and your pee turns brown or orange.)
- Light-colored poop
- Fever
- Fatigue that persists for weeks or months
- Stomach trouble like loss of appetite, nausea, and vomiting
- Belly pain

Symptoms may not show up until 1 to 6 months after you catch the virus. You may not feel anything, and about a third of the people with this disease don't. They only find out through a blood test.

How Is It Diagnosed?

If your doctor thinks you have it, he'll give you a complete physical exam. He'll also check to see if your liver is healthy. The diagnosis is made with blood tests that look for the hepatitis virus and cells that fight infection, called antibodies.

If your disease becomes chronic, your doctor might take a tissue sample from your liver, called a biopsy. This will tell him how severe your case is.

How Is It Treated?

If you think you've been exposed to the virus, get to a doctor within 2 weeks. He'll give you a vaccine and a shot of hepatitis B immune globulin. This protein boosts your immune system and helps it fight off the infection.

If you do get sick, your doctor may put you on bed rest to help you get better faster.

You'll have to give up things that can hurt your liver, like alcohol and acetaminophen. Check with your doctor before taking any other drugs, herbal treatments, or supplements. Some of them can harm this organ, too. Also, eat a healthy diet. If the infection goes away, the doctor will tell you you're an "inactive carrier." After that, he may just watch you closely. If the infection is active for longer than 6 months, he'll tell you that you have "chronic active hepatitis B." He may prescribe some of these medications to treat it.

•Interferon alfa (Intron A, Roferon A, Sylatron). This medicine boosts your immune system. You take it as a shot for at least 6 months. It doesn't cure the disease. It treats liver inflammation. Long-acting interferon, peginterferon alfa2a (Pegasys, Pegasys Proclick) can also help. This drug does have side effects. It can make you feel bad all over, depressed, and zap your appetite. It also lowers your white blood cell count, which makes it harder to fight off infection.

•Lamivudine (3tc, Epivir, Epivir A/F, Epivir HBV, Heptovir). It comes as a liquid or tablet you take

once a day. Most people don't have a problem with it. But if you take it for a long time, the virus might stop responding to the drug.

- Adefovir dipivoxil (Hepsera). This drug, which you take as a tablet, works well for people who don't respond to lamivudine. High doses can cause kidney problems.
- Entecavir (Baraclude). This is the newest drug for hepatitis B. You can take it as a liquid or tablet.
- Tenofovir (Viread). This drug comes as a powder or tablet. If you take it, your doctor will check often to make sure it doesn't hurt your kidneys.

Hepatitis B and Pregnancy

If you're pregnant, you might pass the virus to your baby at birth. It's less likely to happen during your pregnancy.

If your baby gets the virus and isn't treated, he could have long-term liver problems. All newborns with infected mothers should get hepatitis B immune globulin and the vaccine for hepatitis at birth and during their first year of life.

How Is It Prevented?

To help keep a hepatitis B infection from spreading:

- Get vaccinated (if you haven't already been infected).
- Use condoms every time you have sex.
- Wear gloves when you clean up after others, especially if you have to touch bandages, tampons, and linens.
- Cover all open cuts or wounds.
- Don't share razors, toothbrushes, nail care tools, or

pierced earrings with anyone.

- Don't share chewing gum or pre-chew food for a baby.
- Make certain that any needles for drugs, ear piercing, or tattoos -- or tools for manicures and pedicures -- are properly sterilized.
- Clean up blood with one part household bleach and 10 parts water.

Can I Get It From Blood Transfusions?

Donated blood is tested for the virus, so your chances of getting the disease from a transfusion are low. Any infected blood is discarded.

Who Should Get the Hepatitis B Vaccine?

All newborn babies should get vaccinated. You should also get the shot if you:

- Come in contact with infected blood or body fluids of friends or family members
- Use needles to take recreational drugs
- Have sex with more than one person
- Are a health care worker
- Work in a day care center, school, or jail

Is There a Cure for Hepatitis B?

No. But again, it often goes away in a few months, and it occasionally disappears in people who have a chronic case of the disease.

Students picking results slips and certificates are subjected to the same amount. Automatically, we all belong to KISSOSA, let's embrace it. Members are entitled to certificates and shall have the school recommend them for potential employment.

NB: KISSOSA holds annual general meetings once in every two years. There shall be one this December and the venue will be communicated. 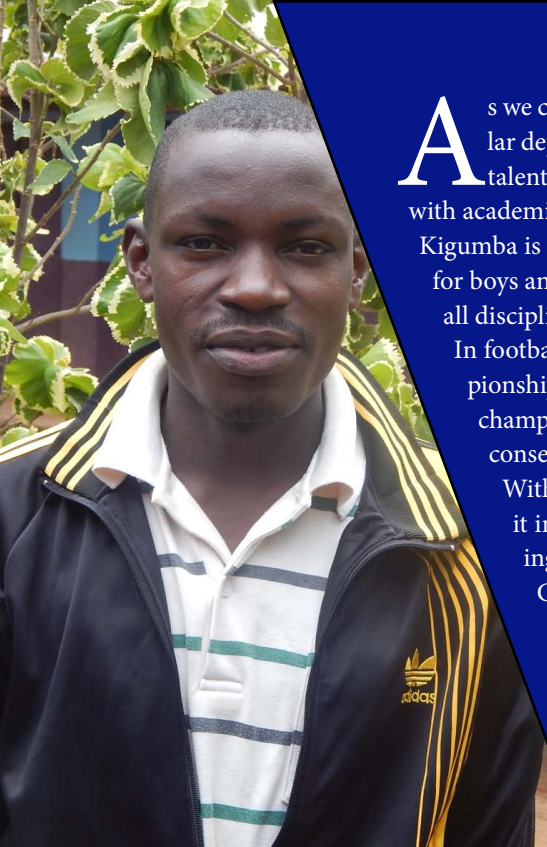
